### Defibrillator

As I mentioned in the last issue, the defibrillator was fitted as planned to the old phone booth by the General Store/Post Office on 1<sup>st</sup> November. Once it has been registered with the NHS it will be commissioned and working. There will be opportunities for training in its use, although the machine itself talks you through the necessary steps to take. This is a valuable resource at a key location in our village - a big thank you to all involved. Once in operation we will send out a village wide email.

## Supporting the Treehouse Fridge in Holt

I am proud to say that each week so far, items of food, household and toiletries, placed in the collection box in the lobby of the Village Hall have been delivered to the Treehouse Fridge in Holt. Many thanks to everyone who has donated items. If everyone who can were to donate just one item a week it would make such a difference to struggling families in the area. To make donating even easier the Village General Store is very kindly hosting a similar collection box. Indeed, the store itself has regularly been donating items - another good reason to patronise it. Items can be donated at the Village Hall and General Store whenever they are open.

Items wanted include:

Long-life milk, fruit, tinned goods, pasta, soup, biscuits, detergent, washing-up liquid, nappies, soap and shampoo, toilet rolls etc.

## Remembrance Sunday, 13<sup>th</sup> November 2022

As mentioned in last month's Chronicle, the Parish Council recently signed-up to the Armed Forces Covenant. This involves the Council supporting current and former members of the armed forces living in our parish and recognising the value of their contribution.

## **Green Village: Climate Change**

*Cllr Patrick Kelly reports back below from a forum on Living with Climate Change that was held at St Andrew's Parish Church on the 6<sup>th</sup> November.*

The forum was chaired by the Bishop of Norwich, the Right Reverend Graham Usher, with speakers Enid Barron (Environmentalist), David Gillam (Extinction Rebellion) and Nigel Lloyd (North Norfolk District Council). The focus was on practical action to address climate change.

### **Individual**

People can just feel overwhelmed by the enormity of global warming. But the cumulative impact of lots of individuals taking small actions can make a huge difference. By way of example, Enid Barron picked just two areas:

i) Food. Carbon emissions can be significantly reduced if we move towards a plant based diet and reduce the amount of meat. Ideally, we should consume food which has been sustainably produced and grown locally. We can save energy (and money) with one-pot meals, cooking several items at a time in ovens and by using microwaves, and slow cookers. Many Councils, though not North Norfolk, also collect food waste.

ii) Fashion. It is estimated that clothing accounts for 10% of green house gases. Fast fashion in particular is associated with forms of modern slavery, excessive use of water, and increased pollution of rivers and oceans. Can we make our clothes last longer and look for garments made from materials such as linen, hemp, organic cotton and recycled textiles.

### **Community**

Extinction Rebellion (XR) seems to be increasing its focus on supporting community action at local and regional levels. For example, 'The Great Collaboration' (<https://greatcollaboration.uk>) collects examples of individual carbon reduction actions in relation to Buildings, Energy, Food & Waste, Land Use, Money, and Transport which are shared within the local community and also with the local council to help them develop plans based on local needs.

### **North Norfolk District Council**

NNDC has a target and accompanying action plan to reach Net Zero carbon emissions by 2030 (<https://www.north-norfolk.gov.uk/media/7736/net-zero-strategy-document-v8.pdf>). Action taken so far includes improving the energy efficiency of

buildings, installing solar panels at the Cromer HQ, increasing the number of electronic vehicles, installing public EV charging points and planting trees. The District Council wants to encourage us to grow some of our food and buy locally sourced produce, to recycle and reduce waste, improve home energy efficiency and install renewable energy or buy green energy and to save water and install water meters and water butts.

## **Church of England**

The Church of England also has a target of reaching Net Zero by 2030 - a major challenge given the nature of its buildings, including 658 mostly medieval churches in Norfolk. Actions range from looking at ways to reduce draughts to the possible use of solar power and heat pumps. In addition, the Church is seeking to improve biodiversity on its lands.

The Bishop is the lead for the C of E on the Environment and, the forum taking place in the same week as the start of the UN Conference of the Parties (COP27), drew attention to the international lack of progress towards the 1.5 degree commitment and the insufficient funding to support those mostly poor regions and nations already suffering the effects of climate change. We were all encouraged to ask 'What Is Enough?', and to live more simply rather than accumulate more and more stuff so that there is enough to share with all.

We'd like to hear what you've been doing to help reduce your carbon footprint, save energy, support local producers, grow your own food or promote biodiversity.

## **Dr Thomas Stephens West OBE, formerly of Pineheath Road**

**1930 ~ 2022**

Tom was born on the 12<sup>th</sup> January 1930 in Rhodesia (present day Zimbabwe). His parents had moved there in 1928 to farm near Bulawayo. His early formative years were spent growing up with his younger sister surrounded by the sights and smells of Africa, which left a lifelong impression on Tom. When he was seven, the family returned to the UK where Tom would complete his education. On leaving Uppingham School Tom served his National Service with the Royal Artillery as a Gunner and was then commissioned and posted to Germany.



After National Service Tom was accepted to train as a doctor at St Thomas' Medical School in London. Following his graduation he was offered a post as a missionary doctor with the Church's Missionary Society at a hospital in Wusasa in Northern Nigeria in 1960. Tom developed the hospital from mud buildings into a modern facility with a 36-bed maternity wing, an operating theatre and 123 beds in general wards. On his return from Wusasa in 1972, Tom was awarded the OBE in recognition of the difference he made to the people of Northern Nigeria.

Whilst Tom was in Nigeria, Dame Cicely Saunders, with whom Tom had been at medical school, was building St Christopher's Hospice in Sydenham, London, effectively starting the worldwide hospice movement. Tom was appointed as deputy medical director at St Christopher's.

In 1980, Tom married Doro. They had met many years before and had a common background as Doro had worked as a missionary midwife in India for many years. Aged 62, Tom and Doro retired to live in North Norfolk, first to Edgefield and then, of course, to High Kelling. He enjoyed his retirement. He was a keen golfer and, with Doro, made many friends playing bridge.

Underpinning Tom's life and his world view was his Christian faith. He was a regular communicant member of the congregations at the Parish Church in Holt and in High Kelling. He read and led prayers in services and always had something to contribute to our study and discussion groups. He strongly believed in the incarnation of God in the person of Christ Jesus and he wrote that he had "looked to the Lord Jesus as a pattern for his life and what it means to become fully human". He believed too in the life which awaits us on the other side of death and again had faith and hope in Christ's journey through the cross to life beyond death, which, Tom wrote, "gives us the promise of life with God, in whose house are many mansions. "

Tom was an intelligent, compassionate, and spiritual man, with a good sense of humour and a positive outlook on life. His life was long and well-lived. He had a

distinguished career and made a positive difference to the lives of thousands of others. Like so many others, I count it a privilege to have known him.

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
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
